Activity	Evidence that supports this approach	Challenge number(s) addressed
<i>Staff CPD</i>	High quality staff CPD is essential to follow EEF principles. EEF Phonics (+5) Phonics has a positive impact overall (+5 months) with very extensive evidence and is an important component in the development of early reading skills, particularly for children from disadvantaged backgrounds. This is followed up during Staff meetings and INSET Days. All staff to lead effectively are released once a term	1,2,3,4

Activity	Evidence that supports this approach	Challenge number(s) addressed
Structured interventions.	EEF- small group interventions. Ensure children have enough time and support to close gaps and make rapid progress.	1,2
One-to-one support and small group interventions led by TAs and Teacher – link to metacognitive approach	EEF evidence shows that this is an effective approach in primary school especially in Literacy where gains of 6+ months can be made. Data analysed termly to identify gaps in learning and interventions planned accordingly.	1,2

Activity	Evidence that supports this approach	Challenge number(s) addressed
<i>Residential costs</i>	For some children the only time away from home during the year is on school residentials. It is essential for their own wellbeing that they experience different settings before writing about it. All residentials are linked to Topics that they are studying.	3, 4
<i>Staff CPD – Risky Behaviours and Restorative Practice</i> <i>Emotional check-ins</i>	Social and emotional learning +4 Social and emotional learning (SEL) interventions seek to improve pupils' decision-making skills, interaction with others and their self-management of emotions, rather than focusing directly on the academic or cognitive elements of learning.	3,4

<p>In 2021-22 Dishforth CE Primary had fourteen pupils receiving Pupil Premium covering all year groups.
